It ties us to the earliest disciples of Jesus, and to the Jews, Israelites, Hebrews, and the patriarchs before.

Scripture, history, and our current intergenerational worship all help us to know our roots in the faith, and nurture us as we grow. By these roots, the trunk, and the branches, we flourish with our Lord Jesus Christ as our head and with the Spirit in and among us, sent by the love of the Father. In this, we know the One, Eternal and Triune God.

We look to the early Church. Yet, if we were to go back in time, the Church then would look very different. Still, if the earliest Christians saw the Church today, I think they would see their living faith has been carried forward. The Church has always had flaws, but it has always been the Church – the assembly called out by God.

Here at SPC, as we work together for the future of our church, the universal Church, and the world in which we live, we must look upon our roots and this cloud of witnesses to continue growing into something new as God intends. Each of you is called to be a piece of the new creation, as individuals and as a community, knowing where we have been, and looking forward to all the new works of faith God has planned for us.





#### WORSHIP NOTES FOR 10:00 A.M. KIRKIN' O' THE TARTAN SERVICE HERITAGE SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 2023

**About the Kirkin'**: Kirkin' is the Scottish word for blessing. It has come to describe a special service of worship that includes all Presbyterians. Together, we give thanks to God for our Presbyterian heritage and ask for God's continued blessing upon us.

The History: The Kirkin' o' the Tartans is of American origin, though based on history and legend in Scotland. After Bonnie Prince Charlie's forces were defeated by the English at the Battle of Culloden in 1746, Scotland once again came under British rule. To control the Scots, a special act was passed that forbade the carrying of arms and the wearing of kilts, plaid, or any tartan that represented Scots' heritage. Orders were given for British troops to kill upon sight any person dressed in Highland garb or displaying the tartan.

As the Legend Goes . . . This act prompted the stubborn Scots secretly to carry a piece of their tartan with them as they went to church, known as the Kirk. The minister then slipped a blessing (a Kirkin') into the service for the tartans. The prohibition against tartans lasted about 50 years. At the repeal of the act, the Church of Scotland celebrated with a Service of Family Covenant, at which time the tartan of each family was offered as a covenant expression for the Lord's blessing.

The First Kirkin': The Saint Andrew's Society of Washington, D.C. held the first Kirkin' during the early years of World War II. The late Dr. Peter Marshall, an eloquent Scot, then Chaplain of the U.S. Senate and Pastor of New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, led the service in 1943, choosing "Kirkin' o' the Tartan" for the title of his sermon. He had preached many sermons in support of the British War Relief and the Scottish Clans Evacuation Plan. His sermons were so popular that a request was made for their publication, with proceeds from the sales designated for war relief programs. As the war continued, the Saint Andrew's Society continued to hold services of unified prayer for the subjects of the British Isles. These became known as Kirkin's.

**The Service**: The worship service is of traditional content, using much of the Church of Scotland form. Central to its theme is the presentation of various tartans—through the carrying of flags and the wearing of tartans—for a blessing. Clans provided protection and economic, political, and social support. The tartan is a symbol of love and togetherness. The Kirkin' is intended to encourage all participants to reflect with thanksgiving on their own family and ethnic heritage and to celebrate God's grace poured out for all generations.

**The Beadle**: The Beadle leads the worship procession carrying the Bible to the front of the sanctuary and the lectern. Reminiscent of an old custom of the Church of Scotland, this tradition highlights the Bible as the Word of our Lord and the center of our faith. The term beadle comes from the Latin term *bedullus*, a word referring to a messenger or summoner of parties to court, which in this case was the Session. The term *bedullus* proved too cumbersome and over time it was simplified to beadle.

Carolina Tartan Stoles: The Chancel Choir is wearing Carolina tartan stoles made by Carolyn Eddins and Betsy Fonvielle. The Carolina tartan was designed in Scotland and adopted as the official state tartan of both North and South Carolina. Both states received their share of immigration from Scotland. The Cape Fear River Valley in particular was home to a large settlement of Gaelic-speaking highlanders. The western region of the Carolinas was settled primarily by Ulster Scots, lowland Scots who migrated to Ireland in the 17<sup>th</sup> century, and later to the colonies. The Carolina tartan is based on a design associated with King Charles II of England; he and his father, King Charles I, established the original land grants for the colony named after them.

**About John Knox**: Before he became a leader of the Reformation in Scotland, John Knox served as a bodyguard. During worship he stood in the front of the church holding a claymore sword to protect the pastor during those dangerous times.

About the Protestant Reformation: The Reformation was begun in Germany in 1517 by Martin Luther who insisted on grace and faith in Jesus Christ alone as the heart of Christian faith. John Calvin, guided by the Bible and Luther's example, helped to establish the Protestant Reformation in Geneva. This included a church governed by elders (presbyters), which became known as Presbyterian. From Calvin's Geneva, Presbyterianism spread to Scotland, and then to the United States, among many other places around the world. John Knox would describe his experience in Calvin's Geneva as "the most perfect school of Christian piety."

**About the Scots Confession**: On August 17, 1560, Reformer John Knox and five of his colleagues presented the first Reformed confession of faith written in the English language to the Parliament of Scotland. "The Scots Confession," as it is now known, united all of Scotland in its politics and in the church. From that day on, the nation was united under a Protestant Flag, emblazoned with the Cross of St. Andrew. This was the birth of the Church of Scotland, a church governed by elders, which became the parent of Presbyterian churches around the world.

More on the Scots Confession: The 25 Chapters of the Confession spell out a contemporary statement of the Christian faith as understood by the followers of John Calvin during his lifetime. Although the Confession and its accompanying documents were the product of the joint effort of a committee, its authorship is customarily attributed to John Knox.

The Book of Confessions: The Scots Confession is an official standard of the Church of Scotland, but was never meant to stand alone. It was approved along with other Catechisms, confessions and a Book of Common Order. Similarly, today, the Scots Confession does not stand alone. It is part of the PC(USA)'s Book of Confessions that expresses the faith of the church in specific times and places throughout history.

## SPC Reports & Minutes

#### **SESSION MINUTES JULY 25, 2023**

<u>Confirmation of Members:</u> Bly Borders and Charlie Schweppe appeared before the session for examination as confirmands. Upon motion by Larry Wilson, seconded by Richard Dedmon, Bly and Charlie were unanimously approved for membership in Shelby Presbyterian Church.

#### **Communications**

<u>Clerk's Report</u> – John Schweppe reported: Recognized Bill Jobe both for his above and beyond service on the Property Committee and to the greater church.

<u>Deacon's Report</u> – Elizabeth Schweppe reported: Growing excitement for the Montreat Church Wide Retreat. Ice cream social was well attended; the June Blood Drive missed our goal by two units; and the August 15<sup>th</sup> drive is seven short of a full schedule.

<u>Pastor's Report -</u> Drew reported: Requested John Auten to report on Ryburn Presbyterian. John reported that our sister church Ryburn is in a difficult place. Membership has declined to the point that there are about 12 active members with less than 30 on the role. John raised the question about how we can support Ryburn in a manner that reflects our grace to them and them to us. After discussion, it was moved by Larry Wilson, seconded by Bill Jobe and passed unanimously that beginning in the month of August through December, we reduce our remittance to Presbytery by \$2,000.00 and direct the same amount be distributed to Ryburn.

Online Votes & Minutes: Minutes for the June 13<sup>th</sup> Session Meeting were read and approved unanimously and ratified Roger Holland appointment as acting Clerk.

#### **Committee Reports:**

<u>Finance Committee</u> – Scoot Dixon reported: June revenue is short due to heavy expenditures this month for youth activities but overall church finances are strong. Significant gifts were made to both Habitat and the Emergency Assistance Fund. <u>Mission & Ministry Committee:</u> Anna Schweppe proposed the installation of a community refrigerator. She explained that other churches have found this mission successful, and it provides a refrigerator (already donated) to be located outside of the church stocked with prepackaged food permitting needy recipients to access on the honor system that which they need. Anna further reported she is committed to being responsible for an active role in the management of this mission and training successors upon her graduation from high school in two years. Upon a motion by Larry Wilson, seconded by Susan Bell and this proposal passed unanimously. Larry Wilson advised that our food ministry, Monday Hot Lunch has 30–35 participants each week and suggested that we activate and encourage the Kitchen Renovation Committee to proceed in finalizing plans for kitchen renovation. Parameters are in place for efficient distribution of emergency assistance.

<u>Property Committee</u> – Fred Blackley reported: Marie Jackson is providing amazing service in all matters related to her service as sexton. Fred also suggested that a committee review the existing janitorial contract with regard to including more detail on cleaning procedures by the janitorial service.

<u>Worship & Music -</u> Richard Dedmon reported: Online advent devotional is in process. A new bulletin template is under consideration possibly using a tri fold bulletin. Confirmation of Bly Borders and Charlie Schweppe will take place on August 6<sup>th</sup>, August 20<sup>th</sup> will include Baptism of Kesson Warrick and Thomas Pruitt and return of our full choir. Motion to approve the Confirmation Date and Baptism by Larry Wilson, seconded by Susan Bell, unanimous approval.
