

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As we enter the season of Lent, I'm reminded of the challenge at the heart of our Christian faith, namely that Jesus told his disciples to take up their cross and follow him.

This is a daunting task. Living under the oppression of Rome and the heavy hand of the religious establishment, Jesus went to the cross. **As God in our flesh, Jesus who had legions of angels still carried the cross to the top of Calvary and died for us.**

The practice of fasting during this time dates back to when Christianity became legal, even favored in Rome under Constantine. Lenten sacrifice became a way to walk with Jesus. No longer persecuted, fasting became a way to take up the cross once carried by martyrs.

Reformation leaders disdained Lent, and it fell out of practice. Persecuted by the Medieval Roman Catholic church, they did not need to follow legalist strictures, as they again knew hardship and the threat of being labeled heretics.

In our current age, a freely chosen self-sacrifice during Lent has become common again, even among Protestants. Such practices acknowledge that we live comfortable lives without the fear of persecution and martyrdom. A fast of some kind might be meaningful for those of us who hold higher status in this world, are rarely hungry, do not often mourn untimely losses, and are often spoken well of by others.

In Luke's gospel, Jesus warns us that comfort distracts us from relating to God and our neighbors. So, then it is in this spirit that I hope you might consider a Lenten fast or spiritual practice that might sharpen your focus on the blessings of God, who draws near to the poor, the hungry, the mourning, and the rejected.

This could come in the form of earnest prayer for others, or by reaching out in humility and with curiosity to those who are not in your social, political, religious or family circles. You might choose to fast from food, so you could donate what you might have spent to the Emergency Assistance fund, the Community Refrigerator, or Food Ministry.

The world is not as it should be, but our hope does not come from our own power, prosperity, or popularity, but Christ who promises that those who lay down the life these things promise, will rise with him in new life, now and forever. No matter what you may choose to do, I pray you do it in the knowledge of God's love for you and respond in the desire to love God and your neighbor even more.

From the Desk of Carol Ann

Why Is Saying Goodbye So Hard?

This past month, I have watched people I love say goodbye to their loved ones. My friend Amy held her mother-in-law's hand as we prayed together, offering comfort in her final moments. My friend Jo Ann lovingly fed her husband, not knowing if this would be his last meal. My cousin Robbie tenderly cared for his wife, who was only 59 years old, as she battled colon cancer, meeting her every need until the very end.

It is difficult to witness people you love caring for those who are dying. But it is even harder when you find yourself in that place, standing on the threshold of goodbye. I am watching my dear friend, Mr. Michael, begin that process. As I read the 25^{rd} Psalm aloud, his lips move along with mine, speaking the familiar words of comfort:

"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for You are with me..."

Why is it so hard to say goodbye? Because love does not end, even when life does. Our hearts were created for eternity, and we long for the day when there will be no more parting, no more pain, and no more tears (Revelation 21:4). Saying goodbye reminds us that we were made for more than this world—we were made for communion with God.

This truth became even more real to me as I watched my son Will in the musical *Dani Girl*. He played a 10-year-old boy who died of cancer and went to heaven. Even though it was only acting, it was hard to watch. I cried—and let's be honest, I cry at everything. Especially if I see somebody crying. So, you can imagine how well I handle actual goodbyes! Someone should probably start carrying tissues for me at all times.

But in the sorrow of farewell, there is hope. For those who trust in Christ, goodbye is not the end of the story. It is simply a transition—a passage from this life into the arms of our Savior. As hard as it is to let go, we can take comfort in knowing that our goodbyes on earth are only temporary.

So how do we say goodbye? We hold hands, we pray, we speak words of love, and we lean on the promises of God. We remind one another that while this moment is painful, the best is yet to come.

When, not if, you find yourself in the midst of goodbye, may God strengthen you. May His peace surround you. And may His presence, which never leaves us, be your comfort in the valley.

And if you see me crying, just hand me a tissue and know that I'm okay—it's just who I am.

What is Emergency Assistance? - Shelby Presbyterian Sharing God's Love

In 2023, at Montreat, in small groups, you were asked about what you loved most about Shelby Presbyterian Church, and where we might do more. In every group, you said you loved SPC's commitment to being a community of believers in fellowship, and the church's commitment to helping the larger community with missions.

It is wonderful to see this community bonding in worship, with our retreat, game nights, the dessert auction, and more. Likewise, the generosity of the church in supporting and doing mission work is awe inspiring, both through SPC ministries and beyond.

One key ministry is the Emergency Assistance Program. Every day, your neighbors call or stop by in need of help with pressing needs. Because of your generous support, hundreds of your neighbors in 2024 received assistance totaling nearly \$60,000. This was funded by \$18,000 from the church budget, \$25,000 from outside gifts, and the rest from your generosity. You are one church making a BIG difference.

For 2025, we need your help again – both financially and as volunteers. The Session has approved a new part-time position to train volunteers to help. We have one volunteer and Marie Jackson, who has seamlessly moved from Sexton to Volunteer Trainer, who have been helping Miranda and Drew with the emergency assistance cases.

Volunteers will be expected to take calls, ask questions, give a sympathetic ear, share the love of God in Christ, and determine how best to help in partnership with other community resources. **Would you be interested in helping for four hours a week?**

With the growing need in our community, we likewise are asking you to prayerfully consider a donation to the Emergency Assistance fund, beyond your existing pledge, to help beyond the budgeted funds. Thank you in advance for your consideration.

SPC Reports & Minutes

JOINT MEETING MINUTES JANUARY 21, 2025

<u>Clerk</u>: Tom passed a sign-up sheet for lighting the Christ candle and conducting the opening liturgy for our meetings in 2025.

<u>Diaconate Report</u>: Michelle reminded everyone of the officers' retreat on Feb. 1st and that she is collecting the \$20 if anyone hasn't paid. The first Diaconate meeting will be in February after the retreat.

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: Drew will finish his portion of the officer handbook this week and Miranda will distribute them. Check your newly reassigned mailbox outside Ellis Hall. Officers' retreat will begin with breakfast followed by sessions with a focus on the Ministerial over Material (members aren't resources, they are ministers to serve and people to be served). Motion unanimously approved to give a representative of the Deacons a "voice without vote" at Session meetings for 2025. Motion unanimously approved to elect Mystie Brotherton to serve as Vice Clerk of Session for 2025. The 2025 Statistical Report is due to Presbytery just before the next session meeting, so it will be sent to Session and voted on via email. The Clerk's Council is proposing that Session opt to reschedule its December meeting (joint with Diaconate) from Tuesday 12/16 to Wednesday 12/17 to avoid the blood drive. Mary Conner pointed out the likelihood of that Wednesday being the last choir rehearsal before the Christmas cantata. A decision will be made later in the year.

Minutes from the December meeting were unanimously approved.

<u>Finance Committee</u>: Carolyn Billings read a finance report from Richard Dedmon: We received a final pledge count for 2025 of 109 pledges totaling \$537,236, compared to 113 pledges totaling \$532,770 in 2024. The Finance Committee has created a 2025 budget of \$692,364 which represents a 2% increase over 2024 budget and a 3% decrease compared to actual 2024 spending. Drew reviewed adjustments to line-item accounts for 2025 budget vs 2024. After brief discussion, Session members approved the proposed 2025 budget unanimously.

Mission and Ministry: Molly reports that the committee recommends that we renew our participation in the Guatemala Partnership. She distributed a copy of the covenant from Presbytery. Our monetary contribution would be \$1500/year for 5 years from the LeGrand fund. Some discussion of our history in the partnership followed and renewal was unanimously approved. Molly then outlined the committee's intended focus for mission in each month in 2025. Discussion of possible ways to help the Montreat Conference Center in the aftermath of Helene resulted in a unanimous approval to collect a monetary offering in February to be sent to MCC to assist with repairs, potentially in areas not covered by insurance, like trails, playgrounds, etc.

Property: Dan reported that June Hobbs has joined the History sub-committee and has transcribed at least one of our history books. She's bringing an archivist from GWU on 1/31 to look at our collection. They will be acquiring archival storage boxes and recommend that none of these records be allowed to leave the church property because many items are extremely fragile. Records show how SPC has been blessed by and has been a blessing to our community. SPC survived its first 17 years with no building, only 1 elder (because women weren't allowed to be elders), and no minister. Less than 10 women held it together. They worshipped with believers in other denominations at the courthouse whenever a pastor came through. Dan distributed an Archives Index and indicated there's a lot more in the archives than originally anticipated. He will be coordinating with the Media Committee to share their findings via social media. The History Sub-Committee recommends that excess copies of some materials be made available to the congregation. Drew suggested that Dan and June give a Wednesday Night Supper presentation on their findings and distribute excess materials at that time. A motion to give the History sub-committee members the authority to cull any excess materials as they see fit was approved unanimously. Bill summarized recent repairs including a roof leak over the F3 classroom and a displaced handrail in the stairwell. He shared his desire to follow through on the previously approved but unfunded insulation project in the education wing and to complete the conversion of older lights to LED to benefit from their energy efficiency in the long run. Session voted unanimously to use \$20,000 from the Cornerstone Fund for an energy efficiency project including insulation and lighting as proposed by Bill and to use \$7,500 from undesignated memorial gifts from the Memorial Fund to cover necessary expenses of the Historical Archive Project, pending Finance Committee review. Old Business-None. New Business-None.
